Although unknown to most Americans, Bishop Katkoff is familiar to millions of Europeans who saw him on television at the opening of the Ecumenical Council. The celebrated prelate sang this invocation for the opening of the Council:

Hear us, O God, Our Saviour, Hope of all the countries of the earth and of those far at sea. Merciful One, be merciful to us sinners! Have pity on us. Merciful and Loving God, we glorify Thee; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now, always, and forever. Amen.

Bishop Katkoff belongs to the Pontifical Russian College in Rome, a College founded by Pope Pius XI to train priests in the Russian Rite. In this special issue of *Catholic Traveler* are several references from Father Pio to Fatima and the conversion of Russia.

Father Pio has said that Russia will be converted when there is a Blue Army member for every Communist.
