

Among "surprise" questions we heard at the School of Apostolic formation in Saint Louis were: "Why doesn't the Cardinal speak up about the First Saturdays? Why ask us lay people to do the job the priests should be doing? Why doesn't the hierarchy stand up for Fatima?"

CARDINAL HAD SPOKEN

In some cities, where we do not know too much about the situation, such questions might not have been a surprise. But just a few hours before the school began in St. Louis the Bishop of Fatima had stopped at the Old Cathedral to venerate the beautiful statue which Cardinal Carberry had brought back to his Archdiocese after His Eminence celebrated the principal Mass of the Feast there on May 13, 1970. A large inscription on a stand beneath the statue explains that His Eminence

consecrated his diocese to Our Lady when he solemnly crowned this statue, and that the First Saturday devotions were held every month in this Cathedral.

Cardinal Carberry happened to be in Rome for the Synod. Bishop Venancio was received by Auxiliary Bishop Joseph A. McNicholas, rector of the Old Cathedral. The last words which Bishop McNicholas spoke to Bishop Venancio as he left for the opening Mass of the school were:

FAULT OF THE LAITY

"We will always have the First Saturday devotions. We will always keep the devotion to Our Lady of Fatima in our Diocese."

It is true that the First Saturday devotions are not being held in every parish, but we dare say that this is overwhelmingly the fault of the laity.

We expect the priests to lead us in everything . . . even sometimes to take us by the hand and get us to Heaven despite ourselves. We have a MAJOR responsibility to do many things for ourselves. First and foremost among these is a response to the requests of Our Lady of Fatima to bring about renewal and reconciliation.

This is not true just because Our Lady appeared to children, to laity. It is, I am fully convinced, because GOD WILLS IT SO.

When the Pilgrim Virgin first entered the United States in 1947 Bishop O'Hara of Buffalo was so impressed with the result that he offered to sponsor the visit of the statue to all the Bishops of the nation. He also proposed public processions of the statue through the streets.

A few weeks later, at a meeting of the Bishops of the United States in Washington, Bishop O'Hara (later Cardinal Archbishop Philadelphia) made his proposal. As a result of the reaction of the Bishops, as well as of his own personal convictions from observing the manner of the traveling of the statue and its effect, said:

"THIS IS SOMETHING WHICH MUST COME FROM THE PEOPLE."

Bishop Venancio told the lay apostles in Saint Louis: "NEVER undertake any action in a parish if the pastor opposes, but do not give up in your approach to the pastor. As Our Lord tells us in the example of the man knocking on the door: Be importunate. Show your sincerity and your persevering willingness TO DO THINGS YOURSELF. Let the pastor know you are not asking him to start something which he will have to end up carrying along by himself."

So many so-called lay apostles blame the priests, and the Bishops, for not responding to the message of Fatima. And, usually that's what it is: Blame . . . "Passing the buck."
